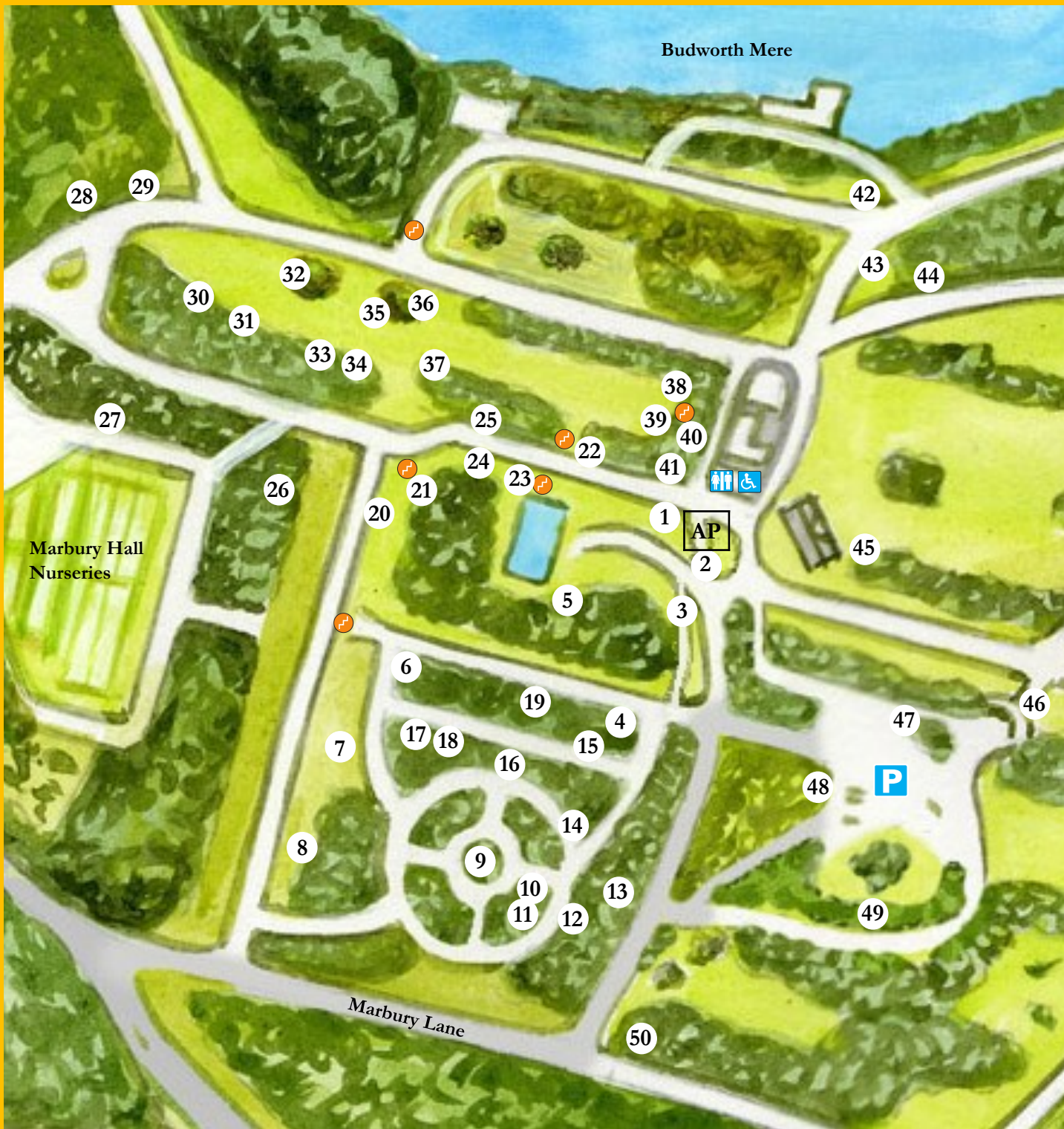

The arboretum of mainly evergreen trees is part of the mid-19th century garden designed by William Nesfield for the Smith-Barry family, who owned Marbury Hall. Newly planted trees were added to existing ones.

The gardens were well maintained until WW2. In 1975 some restoration of the gardens began, when Marbury Country Park was established. In 1985 trees with multi-sensory appeal were planted to provide interest throughout the seasons. Continuing management includes removal of dead or dangerous trees alongside the planting of new ones.
